Chaplain's Corner

Term 4 at Davallia is always very exciting because there is so much to tick off our calendar and because we begin to see the end of year approaching.

As the end of year draws nearer, some students may be feeling excited, while others may be feeling a little nervous, for what is ahead of them next year.

Feeling nervous about this is normal. It means it's something new and at times unknown. When something is familiar, we are naturally comfortable with it, but at times when we face the unknown, we may feel a bit uncomfortable.

Studies show that when we are outside of our comfort zone,—it is often where we grow.

If you notice that your child/children are experiencing nervous feelings about the end of the year and about what is ahead:

- ⇒ Encourage them to focus on persevering. Persevering through a situation, even when it feels uncomfortable, builds resilience.
- ⇒ Encourage them to focus on the excitement of something new coming up. Focusing on the feeling of excitement may mean they focus less on the nervous feeling.
- ⇒ Encourage them to remain positive. Discuss the positive aspects of a new year and the adventures it may bring.

As a result, when next year comes, students will grow stronger academically and physically and will likely become more resilient and confident.

Our Year 6 students are a great example of students that have stepped outside of their comfort zones this year and have grown significantly. Recently, the Year 6 students held their final assembly item, and they highlighted how they are all looking forward to their future and all the possibilities ahead.

As a school community, let's follow their example of courage, stepping outside our comfort zone and encouraging our younger Davallian children to do the same.

I hope all the Year 6 students have a wonderful and memorable time at Camp next week!
