Embrace the Change

I've been a teacher for forty years now, and one of the things I've always loved most about this career is that every new year brings change. Each February feels like turning the first page of a brand-new book, full of fresh faces, new personalities, and endless possibilities.

As teachers, we pour our hearts into each class, guiding, shaping, and polishing until we can proudly say, "They're ready." And then, just as we get them running smoothly, it's time to hand them on to the next teacher, or for our Year Sevens in my day, off to high school. Then, before you can blink, a new year begins, and the adventure starts all over again.

Now, as we head into the final term of 2025, our focus turns to preparing students for their next big steps. Whether it's the leap from part-time Kindy to full-time Pre-Primary, or from Pre-Primary into "big school," each transition comes with its own little challenges and joys.

But let's be honest, change isn't always easy. Most of us like things to stay familiar for as long as possible. Routines feel safe. Change can feel uncomfortable, even for adults! But we know deep down that change is inevitable. Some of it we expect, and some of it sneaks up on us. Some of it even knocks us off balance for a while.

That's why helping our students experience change, and see it through, is such a vital part of education. Every transition teaches adaptability, resilience, and confidence. Each time they face a new challenge and overcome it, they're building skills that will serve them for life.

After all, isn't there an old saying, "A change is as good as a holiday"?

So, let's embrace it, the new, the different, the unknown. Because every change, big or small, brings growth, discovery, and opportunity.

Single parenting

Single parents often say they feel it's more difficult to discipline a child without a partner's support. But it's very important to approach discipline in exactly the same way as if you were parenting with someone else.

It's vital to have a game plan and be consistent. That means setting house rules that don't fluctuate.

It may surprise some people to know that children like boundaries. Kids very easily become comfortable with the familiarity of a routine at bedtime, at mealtimes or when it's time to get out of the house in the morning. Positive and predictable routines mean discipline will become much easier. Life won't have to be full of big battles over little issues!

Another worry many single parents express is the lack of a significant male or female influence in the household. Mothers may feel this more keenly when they're raising a son alone, as many fathers do when they're raising a daughter.

It's always important to encourage your child to have role models and mentors. Role models can show children how to behave, and what is the appropriate thing to do.

So, single parents may want to look for opportunities for their children to get to know and have other men or women in their life. It could be a grandparent, an aunt or uncle, a trusted family friend or a sports coach. Having someone who will serve a mentoring role throughout the child's life can be a great example to – and support for – the child.
